

Confidentiality information for police officers

The Commission of Inquiry into the Queensland Police Service's responses to domestic and family Violence was recently established. It is tasked with, among other things, understanding whether there is, and if so, the extent and nature of, any cultural issues within the Queensland Police Service relating to the investigation of domestic and family violence.

As a result, talking with police is critical.

Your responses will be anonymous.

I will ask you to provide some information about you and where you work as a police officer; however, you will not be able to be identified from these responses.

You will not be asked to provide your name, date of birth or address.

I won't ask you to sign any consent to participate in this interview for anonymity purposes.

When I report on my findings from this consultation process to the Commission, I will inform the Commission of your responses, but not in a way that can identify you. Although your responses will be able to be taken into account by the Commission in undertaking its work, no individual survey participant will be identified or identifiable in the Commission's report, and your responses will be treated with respect and confidentiality.
